#### Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc. which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2020, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Organization's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### **Opinion**

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc. as of June 30, 2020, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

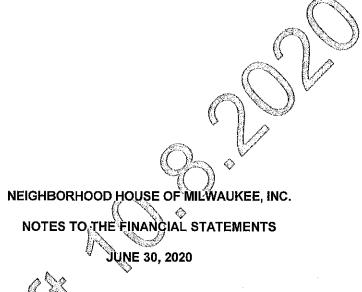

#### NOTE A - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Organization

Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc. (the "Organization") is a non-profit community center founded in 1945 which serves nearly 3,500 area residents each year. Its mission is to inspire and connect to strengthen families and the community. Its vision is to be the cornerstone of a safe and nurturing community. Neighborhood House offers programs for early school-aged children, teens, and families. It also serves as a center for several community-based collaborative initiatives such as the Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) and the Story School after school program. Neighborhood House also operates the International Learning Center, as the largest educator of refugees in Wisconsin, which prepares newly arrived refugees for self-sufficiency by conducting English as a second language and citizenship classes.

#### Accounting Method

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

#### Basis of Presentation

The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

#### Contributions and Grant Revenue

Contributions received and unconditional promises to give are measured at fair value and are reported as increases in net assets. Contributions are considered available for the Organization's general operations and included in net assets without donor restrictions unless specifically restricted by a donor. A restricted contribution is reported in revenue and net assets without donor restrictions when the restriction is met within the same reporting period as the contribution is received. Contributions received restricted for a purpose not yet met or to support a future period are included in net assets with donor restrictions. When a donor restriction from a prior year expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Conditional contributions are not recognized as revenue until they become unconditional. A conditional contribution is one that has both a barrier that must be overcome and an agreement requiring advance payment to be returned or future payment not to be obligated if the barrier is not overcome.

Net assets restricted for acquisition of building or equipment are reported as net assets with donor restrictions until the specified asset is placed in service when the net assets are released to net assets without donor restrictions.

When a donor requires the investment of a contribution and restricts the use of investment income, the investment income is reported as net assets with donor restrictions until appropriated for the designated time or use when the net assets are released to net assets without donor restrictions.

#### NOTE A - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of the gift. Donated services are recognized as contributions if the services create or enhance nonfinancial assets or the services require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Organization. Accordingly, the value of contributed time that does not meet these requirements has not been determined and is not reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

#### **Government Grants and Contract Revenue**

Government grants and contract revenue are recognized when earned. Revenue is earned when eligible expenditures, as defined in each grant, contract or other allowable cost manual, are made. Any cash received for revenue not yet earned is considered to be deferred revenue. Revenue earned but not yet paid to the Organization is included in grants receivable. Expenditures under government contracts are subject to review by the granting authority. To the extent, if any, that such review reduces expenditures allowable under these grants or contracts, the Organization records the disallowance at the time the final assessment is made. Management believes that disallowances, if any, would not have a significant effect on the financial statements.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include all highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less at purchase.

#### Grants and Contracts Receivable

Grants and contracts receivable includes amounts due to the Organization for revenue from services provided or reimbursable costs per grant and contract agreements.

#### Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable includes amounts due related to contract service receivables and receivables from insurance claims.

#### Pledges Receivable

Pledges receivable are recorded when the Organization receives an unconditional promise to give or when the condition is met of a conditional promise to give. Pledges expected to be received in more than one year from the statement of financial position date are discounted for their estimated present value and recorded in long-term assets. Pledges receivable also includes contributions considered to be in-transit as of year-end.

#### **Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts**

Receivables are stated at unpaid balances, less an allowance for doubtful accounts when amounts are not expected to be fully collectible. The allowance is based on experience, third-party contracts, and other circumstances, which may affect the ability of customers to meet their obligations. Receivables are considered impaired if full principal payments are not received in accordance with the contractual terms. It is the Organization's policy to charge off uncollectible accounts receivable when management determines the receivable will not be collected. Management believes all receivables will be collected in accordance with the terms of the agreements. Thus, no allowance for uncollectible accounts is necessary at year end.

#### NOTE A - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

#### **Fixed Assets**

Fixed assets are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. The Organization capitalizes all fixed assets with a value greater than \$2,500. Donated fixed assets are recorded at fair value at the date of donation.

#### **Functional Expenses**

The Organization allocates costs directly to program, management or fundraising whenever possible. Program costs are those associated with carrying out the mission; management are those for management of the Organization including accounting, office expense, human resources, budgeting or board of directors costs; and fundraising costs are those attributed to the solicitation of contributions. Whenever possible, the Organization charges costs directly to program, management or fundraising. Certain expenses are attributable to one or more programs or supporting functions of the organization. Those expenses include maintenance and occupancy which are allocated on direct payroll expenses, and salaries for individuals working in more than one function which are allocated based on an estimate of time and effort in each function.

#### **Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### NOTE B - Accounting Change

The Organization's financial statements have changed to adopt the Accounting Standards Update 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606), and all subsequently issued accounting updates issued to clarify the standards. The updates are effective for the year ended June 30, 2020. The updates are required and establish principles for reporting useful information to users of financial statements about the nature, amount, timing and uncertainty of revenue and cash flows arising from contracts with customers. The core principle of the guidance is that an organization should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the organization expects to be entitled.

#### NOTE B - Accounting Change (continued)

The Organization's financial statements have changed to adopt the Accounting Standards Update 2018-08, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958), Clarifying the Scope and Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made effective for the year ended June 30, 2020. This update is required. The goal of this update is to help organizations determine reciprocal and nonreciprocal transactions. The guidance clarifies that an exchange transaction is when the resource provider receives equal value in return for what the resource provider pays. When the general public is the recipient of the service or goods, the transaction is not considered a reciprocal transaction, it is considered a contribution. The guidance also clarifies that a conditional contribution is one that has both a barrier that must be overcome and an agreement requiring advance payment to be returned or future payment not to be obligated if the barrier is not overcome.

The Organization applied the new guidance using the practical expedient provided in Topic 606 that allows the guidance to be applied only to contracts that were not complete as of July 1, 2019. Results for reporting periods beginning after July 1, 2019 are presented under Topic 606 while prior period amounts are not adjusted and continue to be reported in accordance with legacy generally accepted accounting principles.

The adoption of this new standard did not result in a material impact to the Organization's financial statements. The adoption of the new standard is the new footnote disclosure regarding service fee revenue, fundraising event revenue, and rental income. There was no significant effect on the financial statements related to the adoption of this new standard which would require cumulative effect adjustment to net assets at the date of adoption under the modified retrospective method.

### Future Accounting Pronouncements

Accounting Standards Update 2016-02, Leases (Topic 842) will be effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021. This update requires the recognition of lease assets and lease liabilities on the statement of financial position measured at the present value of lease payments and requires disclosure of key information about the leasing arrangements.

Accounting Standards Update 2016-13, Financial Instruments - Credit Losses (Topic 326) will be effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2023. The main objective of this update is to provide financial statement users with more decision-useful information about the expected credit losses on financial instruments and other commitments to extend credit held by a reporting entity at each reporting date. To achieve this objective, the amendments in this update replace the incurred loss impairment methodology in current GAAP with a methodology that reflects expected credit losses and requires consideration of a broader range of reasonable and supportable information to inform credit loss estimates, including exploring more forward-looking alternatives.

#### NOTE C - Comparative Financial Information

The financial information shown for 2019 in the accompanying financial statements is included to provide a basis for comparison with 2020. The comparative information is summarized by total only, not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity to generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Organization's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2019, from which the summarized information was derived.

#### Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the 2019 financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform to the presentation in the 2020 financial statements. Net assets and changes in net assets are unchanged due to these reclassifications.

#### NOTE D - Concentration of Credit Risk Arising From Cash Deposits in Excess of Insured Limit

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insures all non-interest bearing cash accounts and also interest bearing accounts up to \$250,000 at each financial institution. At June 30, 2020, the Organization's uninsured cash balances totaled \$66,274.

#### NOTE E - Liquidity

The Organization's operations are primarily funded through grants and contributions received throughout the year. Financial assets are expected to be available within one year from the financial position date to meet the cash needs of the Organization for general expenditures and to pay obligations as they come due. Assets subject to donor or other contractual restrictions are not considered to be available for general use. In addition to the financial assets listed below, the Organization has a line of credit of \$300,000 which could be drawn upon in the event of a liquidity need.

#### NOTE F - Restricted Certificate of Deposit - State Unemployment Reserve

The Organization adopted the reimbursement method for state unemployment compensation purposes. As required by the Wisconsin Unemployment Fund, the Organization assures reimbursement to the Wisconsin Unemployment Fund by means of holding a restricted certificate of deposit as a reserve for state unemployment. The balance of the certificate of deposit was \$35,935 as of June 30, 2020.

#### NOTE H - Beneficial Interest - Greater Milwaukee Foundation

The Organization maintains a fund with the Greater Milwaukee Foundation, a community foundation for investment purposes. The Neighborhood House Fund is considered a component fund of the Greater Milwaukee Foundation. The Greater Milwaukee Foundation accepted a contribution from the Organization and agrees to transfer those assets and the return on investment of those assets back to the Organization. The Greater Milwaukee Foundation is legal owner of the assets. The Greater Milwaukee Foundation makes investment decisions and determines the amount of income to be distributed annually to the Organization. The size of distributions from the fund is determined in accordance with the Greater Milwaukee Foundation's distribution policy.

The fair value of the fund as of June 30, 2020 was \$1,248,684 and includes contributions, net investment return, less distributions. The fund includes \$117,263 of income available to spend which may be withdrawn at the request of Neighborhood House, Inc. without any action by the Greater Milwaukee Foundation board of directors. The Board of Directors of Neighborhood House, Inc. designated \$100,000 of amounts contributed to the Greater Milwaukee Foundation in the year ended June 30, 2020, to be held in liquid reserves and which is included in the \$117,263 of income available to spend.

#### NOTE I - Fair Value Measurements

The Organization has adopted the Financial Accounting Standards Board guidance on fair value measurements. A three-tier hierarchy is used to maximize the use of observable market data inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs and to establish classification of fair value measurements for disclosure purposes. Financial assets valued using level 1 inputs are based on unadjusted quoted market prices within active markets. Financial assets valued using level 2 inputs are based primarily on quoted prices for similar assets in active or inactive markets. Financial assets valued using level 3 inputs are based primarily on valuation models with significant unobservable pricing inputs and which result in the use of management estimates.

The amount of unrealized gains or losses for the year ended June 30, 2020, included in the net assets without donor restricted for assets still held at the reporting date was a gain of \$26,750.

#### NOTE K - Line of Credit

The Organization has a revolving line of credit agreement with a bank allowing for maximum borrowings of \$300,000. Borrowings under the line of credit bear a variable interest rate equal to the bank index rate which was 5% as of June 30, 2020. The line of credit matures on April 15, 2021 and is secured by all security agreements, guarantees, mortgages, and other security instruments previously granted, contemporaneously granted, and granted in the future. As of June 30, 2020, the line of credit had no balance.

#### NOTE L - Note Payable

The Organization has a note payable that matures on April 10, 2022. At June 30, 2020, the note had an outstanding balance of \$40,991. The interest rate is a fixed interest rate of 4,25%. The note is collateralized by all assets.

#### NOTE M - Paycheck Protection Program Loan

The Organization has entered into the Paycheck Protection Program and received a loan that matures on April 16, 2022. The interest rate is a fixed interest rate of 1%. The Organization may be eligible for full or partial loan forgiveness based on if the proceeds are spent on eligible expenditures in the loan coverage period and if the Organization meets other loan requirements such as maintaining employment levels as compared to a reference period previous to the loan period. The Organization anticipates the loan will be forgiven or repaid in the year ended June 30, 2021. At June 30, 2020, the note had an outstanding balance of \$352,200.

#### NOTE N - Operating Lease

The Organization entered into a five-year lease agreement for the use of a copy machine on September 25, 2014. Rent expense was \$7,795 for the year ended June 30, 2020.

#### NOTE O - Net Assets With Donor Restrictions

Pledges receivable have an implied time restriction until collected, absent specific donor direction indicating otherwise. Donor designations from the United Way campaign that are included in pledges receivable are considered to be designated for the campaign period, even when collected thereafter, and as such those pledge receivable balances are not included in net assets with donor restrictions.

#### NOTE P - In Kind Donations

The Organization uses space at a local church and is not charged rent, only a portion of the utilities. The estimated fair value of the space received at no charge is \$23,780. The Organization also received \$18,618 of donated labor enhancing a fixed asset which has been recorded in in-kind revenue and fixed assets.

#### NOTE Q - Revenue From Contracts with Customers

#### **Program Revenue**

The Organization receives program service fees for child care and contract services. The fees are recorded as revenue at the point in time that the customer receives the services, such as when the class or educational program takes place. Revenue collected in advance of the program is considered deferred revenue.

For the year ended June 30, 2020, child care fees revenue was \$94,913 and contract services revenue was \$21,556. At June 30, 2020, there were no assets or obligations related to program revenue.

#### NOTE Q - Revenue From Contracts with Customers (continued)

#### Special Events

The Organization holds various fundraising events throughout the year. Registration fees for these events are billed to participants at the time of registration. The event revenue is reported at the amount that reflects the consideration to which the Organization expects to be entitled in exchange for providing the registrants access to the events and event activities. Revenue from these events are recognized at the point in time the event is held and the Organization's performance obligation to hold the event is completed. The Organization also provides the opportunity to sponsor events. Registration and sponsorships for the Organization's events opens months before the events are scheduled to be held. Cash receipts and sponsorships collected in advance of the special events are deferred as contract liabilities until earned when the event is held at which point the revenue is recognized.

At June 30, 2020, there were no assets or obligations related to revenue from contracts with customers. For the year ended June 30, 2020, special event revenue was \$174,411.

#### Rental Incomé

The Organization leased space to various organizations to hold events. Rent revenue is recognized at the point in time the event is held and the Organization's performance obligation to hold the event and provide the space is completed. The rental income for the year ended June 30, 2020, was \$10,663.

#### NOTE R - Conditional Contributions and Grants

The Organization has contracts with government agencies which include specific use stipulations requiring funds be used only on qualifying expenses determined by grant contracts and allowable cost policies. The Organization will not receive the grant funds unless spent on the required activities and within allowable cost guidance. As of June 30, 2020, the Organization has available grant funds of \$222,062, for various programs, which are available through grant periods ending in the year ending June 30, 2021.

#### NOTE S - Retirement Plan

The Organization participates in a 401(k) plan where the Organization will contribute an amount equal to 100% of employee contributions up to 4% to the plan. Employees who work more than 1,000 hours by the first anniversary of hire or 1,000 hours in any subsequent plan year are eligible to participate. The expense for the year ended June 30, 2020, was \$19,106.

#### NOTE T - Income Taxes

The Organization is exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of internal Revenue Code and is classified as other than a private foundation. Management has reviewed all tax positions recognized in previously filed tax returns and those expected to be taken in future tax returns. As of June 30, 2020, the Organization had no amounts related to unrecognized income tax benefits and no amounts related to accrued interest and penalties. The Organization does not anticipate any significant changes to unrecognized income tax benefits over the next year.

#### NOTE U - Subsequent Events

The Organization has evaluated events and transactions occurring after June 30, 2020 through October 2, 2020, the date the financial statements are available to be issued, for possible adjustments to the financial statements or disclosures. The Organization has determined that the following subsequent event needs to be disclosed.

The COVID-19 outbreak in the United States has caused business disruption though mandated and voluntary closings of many businesses and nonprofits. While the disruption is expected to be temporary, there is considerable uncertainty around the duration of the pandemic. The impact, if any, to the Organization's financial position is unknown at this time.

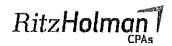

#### NOTE 1 - Basis of Presentation

The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards includes the federal grant activity of Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc. and is presented on the accrual basis of accounting. The information in this schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of the *Department of Health Services Audit Guide* and the *Provider Agency Audit Guide*. Therefore, some amounts presented in this schedule may differ from amounts presented in, or used in the preparation of, the basic financial statements.

General and administrative costs are allocated based on actual direct costs, the Organization does not use the de minimis cost rate.



# Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance With Government Auditing Standards and the Department of Health Services Audit Guide and the Provider Agency Audit Guide

#### Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and in accordance with the Department of Health Services Audit Guide, issued by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and the Provider Agency Audit Guide, issued by the Wisconsin Department of Children and Framilies, the financial statements of Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2020, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated October 2, 2020.

#### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc.'s internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc.'s internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

#### **Compliance and Other Matters**

We have audited the financial statements of Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc. for the year ended June 30, 2020, and have issued our report thereon dated October 2, 2020. Professional standards require that we provide you with the information about our responsibilities under *Generally Accepted Auditing Standards* and *Government Auditing Standards* as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated March 17, 2020.

#### Significant Audit Findings

#### **Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices**

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by Neighborhood House of Milwaukee, Inc. are described in Note A to the financial statements. The Organization's financial statements include implementation of Accounting Standards Update 2014-09, Revenues from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606), effective for years beginning after December 15, 2018. This new revenue recognition standard affects all entities, including public, private, and non-profit entities, that have contracts with customers except where other specific guidance is issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board. The standard eliminates transaction and industry specific guidance and replaces it with a principles-based approach for determining an entity's revenue recognition policies. The core principle of the standard is that an entity should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. The Organization has also implemented Accounting Standards Update 2018-08, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958), Clarifying the Scope and Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made effective for years beginning after December 15, 2018. This standard clarifies the definition of exchange transactions and contributions and provides additional guidance on evaluating if a contribution is considered conditional.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements were:

- Management's estimate of the expense allocation to program, management and fundraising on the statement of activities is based on management's estimate of costs attributable to the relative nature of the expenses.
- Management's estimate of depreciation expense and accumulated depreciation on fixed assets is based on the estimated useful life of the fixed assets.

- Management's estimate of the United Way Donor Choice of \$18,000 included in pledges
  receivable is based on the first quarter's payment received in the year ended June 30, 2020. It is
  estimated that the remaining three quarters will be similar which are expected to be collected in
  the year ended June 30, 2021.
- Management's estimate of the net assets with donor restrictions is based on interpretation of donor
  intentions for time and use based on information provided by donors.

We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the estimates in determining that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

#### Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

#### **Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements**

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole. Significant adjustments recorded after the onset of fieldwork, primarily determined through management's year-end reconciliation processes, included adjusting the childcare receivable by \$18,000, Greater Milwaukee Foundation Beneficial Interest by \$25,000, recording in-kind donations of \$24,000, and recording pledges receivable of \$13,000.

#### Disagreements With Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

#### Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated October 2, 2020.

#### **Management Consultations With Other Independent Accountants**

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Organization's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

#### Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Organization's auditors. With respect to the supplementary information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.
